Drop Off Times

Just a reminder when dropping children off in the mornings that drop off times are between 8:30 and 8:45. This ensures that children are here for the start of the school day. 
We ask that trading cards (hockey cards, pokemon cards, etc.) not come to school as it is impossible to keep track of which cards belong to which students in the event of a disagreement.
